Why is Biosecurity of Personnel Important?

It is possible to reduce the risk of Avian Influenza virus introduction to a premises if personnel take certain precautions, both prior to arrival at the site, and once on the site.

Prior to Arrival

- Determine if you will need to cross the Perimeter Buffer Area (PBA) and/or Line of Separation (LOS)
- Be aware that doing so will require following specific procedures depending on your job duties, if you are dedicated to the site or come from off-farm, and if you have had recent contact with poultry or other avian species
- You may need to sign an agreement ahead of time verifying that you have been informed of biosecurity protocols and will abide by them
- Recommended procedures to complete prior to arriving include
 - Showering and wearing clean clothing/footwear
 - Avoiding contact with poultry, poultry facilities, and areas where soiled vehicles associated with poultry have driven
 - Leaving unnecessary personal items at home
 - Ensuring that your vehicle interior is not contaminated
